\*Extrinsic motivation is when we do something in order to earn a reward or avoid punishment. Intrinsic motivation is when we do something because of how it makes us feel. Extrinsic motivation often decreases intrinsic motivation.

Our goal in Bond-Based is to give our dogs the knowledge and skills they need to make good decisions on their own and the desire to say 'yes' when we must ask them for something.
